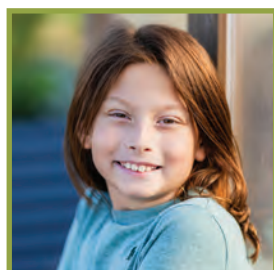

Connor notes that he especially loved Eric Panigada (Support Teacher)—his favorite teacher of all-time.

As graduation approaches, Connor says he feels a mixture of emotions. Specifically, he's excited to wear his cap and gown and celebrate with friends and family—but he's also a bit nervous. After commencement, big adventures await Connor. He's heading to New York on vacation, and this fall, he will attend both Compass (Victory's post-graduate program) and classes at North Pole Studio (a Portland-based art studio supporting neurodivergent artists). And most definitely, NOT the chickens!!!"**

In September 2018, Evan arrived at Victory—leaving his hometown of Springfield, Missouri behind. Since then, Evan has grown into a focused and capable worker, especially when it comes to his favorite part of the school day: Work Experience!

Evan says Work Experience has helped him explore different kinds of jobs and figure out what might be a good fit for his future. Evan says his favorite placement so far is the Wilsonville Killer Burger. He enjoys the food, of course! But even more than the tasty burgers and fries, Evan appreciates the calm, steady rhythm of the work, which gives him space to think and stay productive. Evan says that other jobs he's found enjoyable and challenging include Wilsonville McDonald's (food prep and customer service), OrePac Building Products (warehouse crew), and Wilsonville Parks & Recreation (landscape team).

A New Space for Math and Scientific Discovery

Since opening its doors in 2009, Victory has responded in “real time” to the needs, gifts, challenges, and natural curiosities of the school’s student body. Over time, these responses have included the addition of a large art room and patio in 2018, followed by Rhythm Hall in fall 2020. In fall 2024, Victory completed the new Compass building and flung open the doors to a purposeful and elegant home for young adult learning and community.



Now, it’s time to give math and science a home of its own on the Victory campus.

This summer, renovations began on a 400-square-foot classroom specially designed for math and science. Led by architect James Meyer, who is generously donating his time and expertise for another Victory project, this transformation will turn a narrow hallway and three small rooms into a vibrant, dedicated math and science lab. Scheduled to open in September 2025, the classroom will provide opportunities for student exploration, investigation, calculation, and much more!



Currently, Victory's math and science teacher, **Johnny Holliday**, carts his lessons from room to room on a mobile lab. While resourceful, this system has limits: Materials must be packed and unpacked daily, and demonstrations are constrained by space and classroom configurations. The new lab will lift these constraints and provide a purpose-built space with intentional details.

Designed with Victory students in mind, the new classroom will feature broad counters, large, moveable tables, deep sinks, and protective flooring to support hands-on experiments, crafting, and (often messy) scientific discovery. Inset "sandbox" sensory areas will offer safe, tactile learning opportunities. Students will be able to gather close for demonstrations, to have space to spread out materials, and to participate in both set up and clean-up of experiments—fostering engagement and ownership. The lab will also house student-built robots, fossil and rock displays, a growing science library, and curiosity-sparking materials reflecting the varied interests of Victory's students (such as taxidermy and space travel).

In addition to science, math instruction will also expand and take on new shapes inside the new classroom. Johnny plans to use the room for small group math classes, leveraging visuals, games, and manipulatives to ignite active problem-solving. Johnny also envisions adding coding opportunities for students, aligning with their growing interest in technology, robotics, and computer science. Johnny says, **"Students today carry more computing power in their pockets than NASA did during the moon landing. I want to help them use those tools to build, create, and imagine the future."**

For all Victory students, the new math and science classroom will be a place to wonder, to hypothesize, to experiment, and to dive into numbers. It will be a place where every style of learning is supported—and where curiosity is king!



Compass Finds Its Way

In 2020, Victory proudly graduated the school's first high school class. Prior to commencement, however, Victory had recognized the need for a program to serve these (and other) young adults at the end of their high school careers. While Victory's leadership faced initial disruption of planning and execution due to the pandemic, they did not waver in their vision. They stayed the course and continued to dream, scheme, plot, and plan forward.

In fall 2023, Victory enthusiastically launched Compass, the school's first-ever post-graduate program for young adults with autism and related learning differences. Initially housed in a portable building, Compass opened its own specially designed building in fall 2024. Credit is sincerely owed to everyone who embraced Compass and donated time, talent, and financial gifts to bring Compass and the program's new building to life. In truth, the Compass building is a game-changer for the program and everyone involved. **Program Lead, Melissa Winter, and Behavior Specialist, Monica Yenokida,** have taken full advantage of all of Compass's thoughtful amenities. With a full kitchen (complete with double islands, ample counter space, appliances, and even a beverage fridge), participants have the space and tools to plan, prepare, cook, and share community meals. Fan favorites include Macaroni Mondays, Taco Tuesdays, and Hamburger Thursdays.

Compass also boasts a 16-foot-long table in its generously sized workspace adjacent to the kitchen area. Participants gather for current event discussions, social games, group projects, book groups, safety lessons, and much more. Melissa shares, **"My favorite part of the building is the joint kitchen and workspace area. It is where most of the action happens—everything from cooking and eating together, to playing group games and tackling art projects and puzzles. It is the 'heart' of the Compass home."**

To be clear: Once the participants settled into the new building, Compass lost no time in extending programming to the larger community. In March 2025, Compass launched monthly themed community classes on Tuesday afternoons. March was fiber arts; April was cooking; May was plants and flowers; and the summer months will focus on community adventures. The classes have reunited several Victory graduates with current Compass participants, thus reinforcing friendships and strengthening a vital sense of community for these young adults and their families.

Today, the Compass program continues to evolve, adapting and adjusting to the needs, strengths, and ideas of the participants. This year, every young adult



has expanded work opportunities. They all participate in **Compass Greens** (the program's produce box business) and **Compass Dash** (its lunch delivery service endeavor) building real-world employment skills onsite at Victory. Off site, each participant holds a job reflecting their individual interests and skills. And next year, Compass plans to add mission-driven volunteer opportunities at local non-profits (**Oregon Dog Rescue, Oregon Food Bank [Wilsonville Distribution Center], Ronald McDonald House—to name a few**) and expand individualized skills training (hygiene, budgeting, personal safety matters, etc.)

At the end of the day, Compass is committed to supporting participants the same way Victory Academy is dedicated to serving students: By providing them with an engaging, innovative, and nurturing place to learn and grow. Monica notes, **"I think the connections these young adults make with each other is one of the most valuable pieces of Compass. They have a space to feel comfortable to be themselves, to continue active learning, and to build and maintain friendships."**

And according to **Aidan, Ellie, Miles, Ole, Joe,** and **Prashant (the 2024 Compass Cohort),** we are all cordially invited to stop by on any Taco Tuesday for some delicious lunch fare and lively conversation.



The Beat Goes On!



Since its founding in 2009, Victory has embraced music as an “instrumental” part of the learning and therapeutic journey for students. At Victory, music serves a purpose beyond the extracurricular: It is an essential part of the school’s soul. This year, the beat goes on, under the new leadership and talent of **Music Therapist and Teacher, Ashley Cleary**. Ten years ago, Ashley interned at Victory, returning in 2024 with the core belief that **“music can meet you where you are in ways spoken language cannot.”** This guiding premise comes to life at Victory every day, where music transcends words and brings students together in an inclusive, expressive, and deeply supportive environment. **Whether through group classes, individual therapy sessions, or clubs, Victory’s students find their voices—sometimes literally—through rhythm and melody.**

In fact, Victory’s approach to music is anything but one-size-fits-all. Everything about music at Victory looks quite different than in traditional schools. One student might jump to their feet during class, fully immersed in his own “whole body listening,” while another child energetically taps her chair to the beat. Simultaneously, a fellow classmate quietly sits, simply listening and imagining. All three responses are equally celebrated. Ashley explains, **“Every student is heard in Rhythm Hall (Victory’s designated music space). There’s no wrong way to experience music. What matters is that each student feels safe, seen, and supported.”**

On any given day, the energy and emotion inside of Rhythm Hall are palpable. With Ashley’s guidance and therapeutic lens, students express complex emotions in safe, structured ways-- aligning with the cathartic power of music to process and share their inner worlds. Recently, Ashley supported a middle school student through his own complex feelings of anxiousness and sorrow. Together, Ashley and this student began by

simply sharing songs and connecting the lyrics back to the student’s feelings; this process allowed the young man to name and navigate his emotions through the power of song.

Music at Victory, in its many forms and iterations, provides the opportunity for every student to build confidence, take creative risks, and find their own “voice”. In the fall, Ashley brought to life two popular offerings: **Karaoke Club** and **Glee Club**. During Karaoke Club, participants can select a song, sing, dance, and/or simply groove with their friends. Song choices range from Johnny Cash’s “Ring of Fire” to Taylor Swift’s “Shake It Off”. During Glee Club, a select group of students practice harmonies and dance moves, learn new melodies and drama techniques, and ultimately, engage in group performances. This year, Glee debuted at **Victory’s Annual Breakfast of Love** with their adaptation of Sam Cooke’s “Don’t Know Much”. Of course, they received a well-earned standing ovation.

This year, the Victory beat is louder and more powerful than ever before!

For example, Arlo teaches math concepts through landscape projects, woodshop class, and tabletop games. Arlo says that he "loves Victory's mission
